

The First Punic War: The First Punic War broke out in 264 B.C. between Carthage and Rome over ownership of the island of Sicily. Carthage's strong navy defeated Rome early on, but Rome responded by building a stronger navy. Rome then defeated Carthage repeatedly and took control of Sicily, Sardinia, and Corsica.
